Dear Students, Parents, and Friends of Boulder High School:

As you know, March is CSAP month. We will be testing all 9th and 10th graders on Mar 4, 5, 11, 12. Parent-teacher phone conferences are scheduled on Mar 4, 5. On Mar 12 (A-K) and on Mar 13 (L-Z) we are holding arena-style parent/teacher conferences in the gyms and cafeteria.

CSAP TESTING – BHS needs your support with CSAP. For the past two years we have received an “Excellent” school rating from the state. The “Excellent” rating is important to us. Continuing to receive the “Excellent” rating is dependent upon all students being tested. Students who are not tested are factored into the total school scores with zeros. It is plain to see how a few “0” scores calculated into the total can bring our school’s scores down. Keep in mind that everyone benefits from an “Excellent” rating. Colleges look at our rating and know that our school has high academic standards. The data from CSAP helps our School Improvement Team (SIT) to set meaningful goals and teachers can review how their students measure up to content standards. Students, CSAP provides you an opportunity to practice test taking skills before ACT and SAT tests in the junior and senior years.

School Safety – As a standard practice, I will communicate with students and parents through e-mail anytime there is a threat at school. We will always take safety seriously. Our campus monitors do an excellent job of controlling visitors to our building. Marcus Askins, the school resource officer, monitors building safety and reviews potential problems with us at weekly meetings. Most importantly, we are building a culture where adults listen to and respect our students. The best security plan is when students see or hear something unusual and report that information to us. We continue to advertise our Safe2Tell hotline number, where students can report concerns anonymously. **The Safe2Tell number is: 1-877-542-SAFE.** If you currently do not receive BHS E-News and want to receive it, simply email me and I’ll add your address to the list.

Snapshot Survey – Soon you will be receiving in the mail the Snapshot Survey from the school district. I encourage you to complete the survey. Your input is valuable to us as we reflect on our work with students and meeting their needs. The School Improvement Team and TIES Team use the data to set goals.

Ground Breaking Ceremony – Apr 4 at 9:30 am on the south lawn near the softball field, we will celebrate breaking ground for the remodeling and new additions to BHS. I will send you more information about this event through BHS E-News.

Concurrent Enrollment for 2008-2009: An Academic Opportunity

Colorado law provides high-school juniors and seniors with the opportunity to enroll in college classes (including those at CU-Boulder) while still in high school. Specific guidelines must be met, but this is a special opportunity for motivated BHS students. Information packets with details for next year's program will be available in the BHS College/Career Center in early April.

Choosing Classes

Course selection for current 9th, 10th and 11th graders began with a presentation to all students during their third period class on Wed, Feb 20. The Infinite Campus portal for course selection opened Feb 21 and will be open until 3 pm on Mar 14. Students should talk with their teachers and counselors about their choices. Specific directions for course selection are on the BHS website (<http://schools.bvsd.org/boulderhigh>).

Plan your four-year high-school program to keep your options open. Opt for the most challenging program that you can handle. Build your foundation with solid core courses; try to include four years each of study in English, math, social studies, science and foreign language. Fill out your schedule with courses in computers, the humanities (such as music and art), PE and additional electives such as speech, debate or journalism.

Ideally, you should take all college admissions exams by the end of grade 11 or the start of grade 12. Therefore, your math sequence is of prime importance. Because the SAT I exam covers work through algebra II, it is important to complete algebra I and II and geometry no later than the end of grade 11, and preferably earlier.

Choose science courses with a lab component. Science labs help hone your analytical skills. Ability to interpret lab results yields higher scores on the ACT exam. Rigorous English and social-studies classes improve critical reading and writing skills and enhance vocabulary. This comes in handy on the new SAT I writing section as well as in adult life.

Most colleges prefer two or more years of study in a single foreign language. Foreign-language placement exams are often used by colleges for placement in classes or to fulfill college foreign-language requirements.

Provide yourself with the greatest number of college options. Build your foundation with challenging high-school classes.

Seniors to do your very best work. You should not slump in the quality of work you are doing; college acceptances are provisional until your final senior grades and class rank have been received.

- Submit any scholarship applications strictly according to deadlines. Do not expect waivers or extensions. Notify Mrs. Allen or Mrs. Gebhardt in the College/Career Center when you have decided on a college.
- After receiving admission/acceptance, respond promptly to the college, notify Mrs. Allen or Mrs. Gebhardt of your decision to facilitate mailing of your final transcript, and inform your counselor of your decision.
- Request summer-orientation information from the college of your choice.
- Check Naviance regularly for scholarship announcements.
- Write to the other colleges to withdraw your application after you have been accepted, made a decision, and confirmed your acceptance with the college of your choice. This notification period lasts through March and April.

Juniors:

- Begin or continue exploration of colleges. If possible, narrow your choices.
- Access college websites to request information packets and catalogues.
- Check college catalogues or websites to see which tests are required. Most colleges require an admission or placement test during the junior or senior year of high school. (Sometimes an SAT II subject test is taken during the sophomore year.) Testing in

the junior year provides flexibility with application deadlines and allows for the possibility of retaking | a test early in the senior year to improve a score. Information and registration forms for the SAT I and ACT are in the Counseling Office or you may register on-line. The ACT is given to all BHS juniors on Apr 23 at BHS.

- Select courses required for college or specific post-high-school skilled jobs.
- Consider visiting colleges during spring break and the summer before senior year.
- Begin serious investigation of US military academies. Contact your US Representative and Senator to express a desire to be nominated. Most nominating authorities conduct preliminary screening exams during the summer before senior year.

Sophomores:

To keep track of your coursework and high-school requirements; make sure to take classes that fulfill your graduation requirements.

- Take classes that help you meet your post-high-school goals.
- Consider additional coursework options such as those provided by Front Range Community College for specialized programs.

Freshmen:

Evaluate your first year at Boulder High.

- Take classes that help you meet your post-high-school goals.
- Consider becoming involved in clubs, activities, sports, musicals, or other extracurricular activities.

Parents:

Encourage your students to get involved!

Boulder Technical Education Center

Representatives from Boulder TEC visited all BHS World Literature classes on Jan 24 to discuss career pathways as well as various options open to students who enroll at TEC full-time or part-time. TEC programs include automotive, architecture and drafting, banking and accounting, computer information systems, construction, cosmetology, engineering graphics, health care, veterinary aide and multimedia technology. For more information about the programs at TEC, contact your counselors. If you have an interest in shadowing at TEC, you will need to fill out a "Request to Shadow" form and submit it to your counselor.

What is Naviance?

Naviance is a web-based program that BHS counselors use to track college application. As well, students will find a personality/career assessment and a "learning styles" assessment, both of which may be discussed in greater detail with a counselor after a student completes them. In addition, students are able to see what sort of applicant has typically gained entrance to specific colleges. In other words, if a student has a GPA of 3.2 and a SAT score of 1230, what are his/her chances of getting into USC's film school? UCLA? Princeton? CU Boulder? Naviance gives students access to statistical data that show them how students of similar academic standing did when applying to certain universities, both in and out of state. Students who use Naviance are also able to do broad college searches based on parameters such as location, school size, acceptance ratios and cost. While this program is similar to the one the College Board puts out, Naviance's

program has one important advantage: it is integrated with the student's own application process, and the student's counselor will have access to the information generated by the student's search.

In the end, our goal is to see that every student who applies to college applies to schools that match both their interests and aptitude. In addition, we hope to cut down on red tape, paperwork and the inevitable mistakes of a cumbersome paper process. If, along the way, a student or two is able to narrow their college search, the use of Naviance is well worth the effort. What motivates and informs this process is both the changing world in which we live – more and more information available and the need for having a way to access and utilize it – and the necessity of having easy access to important and changing data.

Juniors Get Ready: ACT Test April 23

State law requires all juniors to take the ACT test. BHS is giving the test on Wed, Apr 23. There is no charge to the student and no pre-registration. Juniors may want to see how they perform on this test before paying to take the test on another date. If they are not satisfied

with their Apr 23 performance, they can register and pay to take the test in June of this year or fall of next year. The results of the ACT test administered at BHS are accepted by most colleges and universities, except for military academies.

AP Exams May 5-12

The Advanced Placement (AP) program allows high-school students to take college-level courses. It gives them the opportunity to show that they have mastered the advanced material by taking AP exams. Students can receive credit, advanced placement, or both from thousands of colleges and universities that participate in the program. AP exams will take place May 5 – May 12. The detailed schedule of exams and times can be found on the BHS website.
