Dear Students, Parents, and Friends of Boulder High School:

It was great to see so many of you at parent-teacher conferences. I believe parent support plays an important role in student success. The increased energy level brought on by the end of the calendar year seems to hit its stride by mid-November. With the coming of the second six-weeks grade report (posted on Infinite Campus on November 12), an anxiously awaited week-long break, upcoming holidays and, ultimately, finals, I ask that we work together to keep students focused and on-track and as de-stressed as possible.

Over 420 sophomores and juniors took the PSAT on October 16. This test represented a great college-admission test practice opportunity for our sophomores and for our juniors, a qualifying test for National Merit Scholarship consideration. Based on last year's PSAT results, we had 11 National Merit Semifinalists and 18 Commended Students. I trust this year's test-takers found this to be an enlightening and educational experience.

Thank you for supporting Boulder High during the state-wide October Count of students. As you know, this critical count period determines the per-student funding we receive. By not scheduling appointments or vacations during this time, you have enabled us to maximize our student funding.

In October, we hosted over 180 college representatives from across the U.S. and Canada. Many of our juniors and seniors took advantage of this golden opportunity to learn more about the college(s) of their choice, facilitate the admission process, and to let the college representative put a face to their name. Visits such as these can play a key role in the college admission process.

At the end of November, the Open Enrollment period begins in the Boulder Valley School District. If you have younger children, or friends with children, who are considering Boulder High for 2011–2012, we invite you to our Showcase Evening, Monday, November 29 at 6 pm, where we will highlight the diverse programs we offer and provide you the opportunity to speak with teachers, students, and administrators. Scholarship News

We receive new scholarship information constantly. Our listings are located on Naviance and in the Scholarship Notebook in the Counseling Office as well as online on the BHS website (**Departments > Counseling > Scholarship Info**). Students are urged to check these listings. Also, *Jo-Ann Beserra*, parent volunteer, is available in the Counseling Office on Wednesdays from 1:00–3:00 pm to answer scholarship questions. There is a sign-up sheet in the Counseling Office.

Naviance logons/passwords are available from your student's counselor.

Seniors: Graduation Credit Check Due — Sign Up Now!

Parents, please remind your senior to sign up and complete a Senior Graduation Check if s/he has not already done so. This 30-minute session focuses on the student's progress toward graduation. Your senior must complete two forms, a Release of Records and an Application for Diploma (available in the counseling office), before meeting with his/her counselor. If your senior has lost credit because of past absences, it is important that s/he sees his/her counselor and *Jeff Santee* in Connections **NOW**. Don't wait until the second semester to try to retrieve lost credit.

SENIOR COLLEGE COUNTDOWN

Now:

- Carefully check your transcript for accuracy. You will send it to colleges and want it to be right.
- Continue researching your college options through Naviance.
- View college applications online and get a clear picture of your application tasks.
- Review your ACT and SAT testing schedule and sign up for fall testing dates as needed.
- Prepare letter of recommendation folders for your teachers and counselor.
- Present your recommendation folders to your teachers and counselor so they have ample time to work on them.
- Thank your teachers and your counselor for writing a recommendation for you.
- Be well informed of the deadlines and requirements of your prospective colleges.
- If you plan to apply under Early Decision, research what this will mean for you as far as financial aid and other deadlines are concerned.
- Begin researching scholarships online through Naviance or the Counseling Department webpage.
- Continue gathering applications and finalize your list of prospective colleges.
- Get moving on your applications!
- All recommendation requests must be in to Counselors before the Thanksgiving Holiday.
- Beware of Early Action/Early Decision deadlines!

December

- Parents begin working on the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). The applications are online at fafsa.ed.gov.
- Continue researching scholarships on Naviance.
- Finish college applications!
- Verify that all of your application materials have been sent out.

January

- Make arrangements with the Counseling Office to have mid-year grade reports sent to your colleges.
- Prepare to file all Federal Financial Aid forms—preferential filing date is usually February 15.

February

- You are almost there! Continue the scholarship search.

March

- Decision letters will begin to arrive.

April

- Evaluate your financial aid offers.
- Prepare to notify your college of choice by May 1 of your decision to attend.

May

- Submit your request to have your final transcript sent to the college of your choice.

JUNIOR YEAR PLANNING GUIDE

Now

- Take your coursework very seriously. Your GPA and the classes you take this year are very important for your college admissions next year.
- Talk with your parents about college costs. Knowing now how much they can contribute may affect your decision about where to apply.
- Start gathering information on scholarships. If you hope to qualify for an athletic scholarship, introduce yourself to coaches at the colleges you are considering (athletic resume and/or video e-mail).
- Start (if you haven't already) working on a list of prospective colleges on Naviance.
- Take the PSAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test.
- If you are interested in attending a Military Academy, pick up "A Guide for Students Interested in the Military Academies."
- Review your PSAT results and decide whether you'd benefit from an SAT preparation course.
- Continue to work on your college list.

January & February

- Check with your colleges to see if they require or prefer the ACT or the SAT.
- Sign up for an SAT at www.collegeboard.com (you will take the ACT at BHS in April).
- Check out local test prep courses and resources available for both tests in the Ozone, in our office, and on our website.
- Sign up for a solid course load for your senior year. The courses you choose will be listed on the transcript sent to colleges.
- Sign up for a meeting with your counselor to do your junior credit check and senior course selection.

March & April

- Identify the characteristics of a college that matter to you—size, location, cost, academic rigor, social environment, diversity, for example—and finalize your list of schools to visit.
- Plan to be on campus while schools are in session.
- Do your best on the ACT at Boulder High in April. No charge and no registration necessary!
- Register for May SAT and June SAT Subject Tests in academic subjects that may be required for schools to which you are applying early.
- Attend regional college fairs.

May

- Take Advanced Placements tests and prepare to take the June ACT or SAT tests.
- Register online with the NCAA Clearinghouse if you plan on playing college sports. Directions and a packet to help you with this process are available in the Counseling Office.

Summer

- Check out applications for prospective colleges online.
- Start thinking about your essay topics. Consider who might write your recommendations.
- Compile a resume of activities, honors, leadership positions, and job experience.

Shadowing

The BVSD Open Enrollment period is fast approaching and so are the shadowing weeks at BHS. This year we are looking for volunteers that can help with these events in two ways:

- Bake muffins or cookies or bring in bagels or donuts for the 8th and 9th graders on the shadowing days. We need little treats for about 100 students per day.
- We need volunteers for the actual shadowing days to help with the sign-in. The dates are November 15, 16, 18, and 19 for the first week and January 10, 11, 13, and 14 for the second shadowing week following winter break. Since we have two shadow sessions per day, your time commitment would be 30 minutes, either in the morning (8:15 to 8:45 am) or around noon (11:45 am to 12:15 pm).

MODEL UNITED NATIONS

Students Organize Successful Model United Nations

320 students from 15 high schools, scattered around Boulder High School on September 25, debated and negotiated solutions to real world problems at the 5th BHS Model United Nations Conference. Discussions and problem-solving were lively and mostly well-informed as student delegates represented their countries' points of view and interests in the various councils.

The BHS MUN team's 19 most-experienced team members served as presiding officers and parliamentarians, but less-experienced BHS delegates still earned 12 awards—double the number of the next team.

In addition to the traditional tribute printed in the yearbook, for \$5 a color or black & white photo with your senior's name (no message) can be included in a slide show on the Yearbook DVD. Here's how to order yours.

Traditional Tribute:

- ◆ Provide us with a candid photo or photos. **Be sure to write the senior's name and a return address on the back of each photo.** Only photos that are accompanied by a self-addressed, stamped envelope will be returned by mail in the spring. All other photos must be picked up in the publications room before **May 20, 2011**. While we will make every effort to return photos by May, be aware that we cannot take responsibility for lost or damaged photos. Therefore, you may wish to provide us with a duplicate print to safeguard against loss.
- ◆ In the space provided below or on a separate sheet, write a message to your graduate no longer than the specified number of words per size purchased ($\frac{1}{8}$ = 15 words, $\frac{1}{4}$ = 30 words, $\frac{1}{2}$ = 60 words, Full = 120 words). Messages that exceed the limit will be edited to length. No exceptions.
- ◆ Please be aware that all tributes are student designed. Staff members will make editorial decisions about fonts, photo cropping and placement. For a more custom look, you may submit a professionally designed tribute. Professionally designed tributes should be submitted on disk and be in the form of a jpeg at 300 ppi. Dimensions: Full = 8.34 X 10.68 inches; Half = 8.34 X 5.25 inches; Quarter = 4.1 X 5.25 inches; Eighth = 4.1 X 2.5 inches.
- ◆ Please do not submit "nudie baby" photos. The *Odaroloc* staff reserves the right to reject tributes containing objectional images or messages.
- ◆ Please limit the number of photos submitted as follows: 1 per $\frac{1}{8}$ page; 2-3 per $\frac{1}{4}$ page; 4-5 per $\frac{1}{2}$ page; 6-7 per full page. If the number of photos submitted exceeds the limit, staff reserves the right to delete photos.
